The behavior of German biomedical scientists from 1933 to 1945 provides many of history's most awful examples of human rights abuses undertaken in the name of research. This dialogue will review the issues of Nazi clinical experimentation, eugenics and the physician-patient relationship, among others, and draw some lessons for the current era, especially in light of recent revelations concerning U.S. radiation experiments on humans.

Dr. Michael J. Franzblau is Clinical Professor of Dermatology at the University of California School of Medicine in San Francisco and a lecturer in the Department of the History of Health Sciences. He is a guest lecturer at Stanford University School of Medicine's Center for Biomedical Ethics and Human Biology.
