# The Academic CV: Should it Portray the Good, the Bad and the Ugly?

The curriculum vitae is the academic professional's documentation of education, funding, publications and service. It provides an overview of a scholar or researcher's academic accomplishments, and is used for employment and funding opportunities. Curiously, there is little guidance on whether all information must be provided in a CV. For example, should retracted publications and other negative results be listed? This Dialogue will provide examples of researchers who have altered their CVs for favorable presentation and will seek feedback from the audience on the suitability of this process.

Dr. Champney joined the University of Miami's Miller School of Medicine in 2009 to teach first-year medical students histology and neuroanatomy. He is a faculty member in the Institute for Bioethics and Health Policy and has helped teach the Responsible Conduct of Research course along with a graduate-level Research Ethics course. He has written widely about the ethical use of human tissue, notably the use of willed bodies for education and research.
